During community engagement on the Anti-Racism Data Act (https://antiracism.gov.bc.ca/history/), Indigenous, Black, and other racialized communities called on government to take a coordinated approach to collecting demographic data.

We invite you to take the BC Demographic Survey. This survey will inform our efforts to identify systemic racism and make B.C. a more equitable province. This survey was created through engagement with the public and Indigenous, Black and other racialized communities.
